


#### What is Crime?

• Actions that will constitute an offence under English and Welsh law and are punishable by the state.

#### What is Deviance?

 Any behaviour that violates social or cultural norms or accepted standards.
 Much of society will generally disapprove of deviant behaviour.

### Unit 1: Changing Awareness of Crime

- The purpose of this unit is for learners to plan campaigns for change relating to hidden crimes.
- You will learn about reasons for hidden crimes, impacts on victims and sources of evidence. You will then design a campaign around a brief to show how you would try to reduce the criminal activity, raise awareness or support victims.

If you could do anything to change people's view/opinion of crime in the UK, what would you change and how would you do it?

### Unit 2: Criminological Theories

- Unit 2 builds on Unit 1 and delves into sociological, psychological, biological and individual reasons for committing crimes.
- You will have to explain how these reasons link to policy implementations and some of the campaigns you have researched in Unit 1.
- Why do people commit crime? Is it due to biological, psychological or sociological reasons? Which crimes are people likely to report? What makes someone a serial killer or domestic abuser?

#### Unit 3: Crime Scene to Courtroom

- This unit is about developing the understanding and skills needed to examine information in order to review the justice of verdicts in criminal cases. This includes the role of the judiciary, collection of evidence, court processes and key personnel.
- You will research key cases to evaluate the success of the CJS for example; Stephen Lawrence, Amanda Knox and OJ Simpson.
- What needs to happen to ensure someone receives the appropriate sanction for their crime? What are the roles of personnel involved when a crime is detected? What happens to a suspect once charged by the police and the Crown Prosecution Service (CPS)?

#### Unit 4: Crime and Punishment

- Unit 4 is a synoptic topic that brings together all of the units in the course. You will evaluate the effectiveness of the process of social control in delivering policy in practice. For example what is the purpose of punishment?
- Why do most of us tend to obey the law even when to do so is against our own interests? What social institutions have we developed to ensure that people do obey laws? What happens to those who violate our legal system? Why do we punish people? How do we punish people?




#### Unit 3


