Helen Sharman CMG OBE Visits Chatham Grammar



Chatham Grammar was excited to welcome Helen Sharman CMG OBE on Tuesday 10th May. Helen became the first British Astronaut in May 1991, aged 27, when she launched a Russian Soyuz spacecraft. She spent eight days orbiting the Earth, living and working on the Mir Space Station.

Helen delivered an inspirational talk to students about living in Space, astronaut training, teamwork, leadership, communication, collaboration and motivation including photographs of which she took herself during her time on board the Mir Space Station. Helen says "We should push forward, not only our individual boundaries, but also the boundaries of what humans believe is possible. People are the biggest limitations in our own lives. There's a huge amount we can do and we should make the best use of our lives for the benefit of the world."






Think. Create. Innovate.

Students have spent the rest of the term investigating our "Sustainable Futures" theme, beginning with constructing their own turbine-powered machines. We have ended the term preparing for our next project, the "Sustainable Futures: Innovation Challenge" - with the following organisations, Royal Academy of Engineering, This is Engineering and the University of Kent. This theme continues into next term and Miss Mundy is looking forward to seeing the projects come to life! University of Kent Sociology Workshops

This term we have been extremely lucky to be able to invite the School of Policy, Sociology and Social Research from the University of Kent to Chatham Grammar to work with our Year 12 Sociology students.

Students took part in four different workshops during the course of a month. The sessions covered the following topics:

Week one: "Does life matter if you live forever?"

Students debated the consequences of an ageing population, the policies that would be needed to sustain an increased population and created their own societies based in 2060 with an average life expectancy of 150.

Week two: "Rise of the Robots: Thinking Critically about Algorithms"

How does the use of algorithms in search engines, media, law enforcement, transportation, food and healthcare change human interaction? Students learnt about the consequences on society and individuals when computers can gather mass data and then debated the role of algorithms for governments, corporations and humanity.

Weeks three and four:

Students looked at the elements of methods in context for their exams and created a group research project that they conducted and presented back to the other groups. They researched illegal drug use in Medway through official statistics, how parental nationality impacts educational attainment, gender and subject choice, factors impacting on student motivation, the impact of marketisation on students through exams, how ADHD is portrayed by the media, does education need to be changed after lockdown, class background and education, and Islamophobia in the media.

Student have made some fantastic presentations that have used sociological language to evaluate the strengths and weaknesses of their projects and consider the theoretical advantages or disadvantages compared to ethical and practical restraints.

We went and found data instead of just writing about it, which gave us a real feel of what it would be like to be a sociologist in the future. The Year 8 students were using vocal loops and were exploring different ways in which these could be developed and manipulated through using GarageBand. The Year 10 GCSE Music students were exploring ways to compose a piece of music based on a starting cell of notes.

All groups performed and presented their musical masterpieces at the end of the three workshops.

As a result of the relationships formed during the workshops, our Year 10 GCSE Music students have been invited to the University for a tour of the music department, meet the undergraduate students again and get a chance to see what studying music at university entails.

Year 7 Biology Model Making



Year 7 have been studying biology and learning about the different types of cells. They learnt that eukaryotic cells contain our DNA. They also learnt that eukaryotes are complex organisms and therefore have many different types of cells. They were asked to research specific specialised cells found in both animals and plants.

Students worked in teams and produced a PowerPoint of information and examples and then presented this to the group. They were then asked to produce a model of one cell of their

choice, using anything they could find at home. Students brought their models in and presented them to the group.

The group provided observations and also questions related to the models and the presentation. Questions like "You appear to have forgotten to include chloroplasts in your root hair cell, why?" Leadership points were then given for answers that provided the correct justification/answer. "The root hair cells are found within the soil so do not access light, so this part of the plant will not photosynthesise and doesn't need chloroplasts."





The students are very proud of their work. Different classes that use the room have also given some really nice comments about the work; some have been testing their peers and using the models as props.

UKAT Partnership Development Programme University Super Saturdays

The Super Saturdays with the University of Kent (UoK) took place over three consecutive Saturdays in March 2022, the creative puppet and Amazing Minds sessions were a great success. Aslan the puppy, our newest Dog Mentor was a firm favourite with the students tool

Our next series of Super Saturdays will be delivered by the University of Kent's Computer Science department. Students will be developing, building and programming their own LEGO robots. The workshops will take place in June 2022 for a small fee of £5 for all three sessions. The sessions are already fully booked!

During Term 5 there have been lots of different challenges for students based around the theme of Helen Sharman and the Platinum Jubilee that have been linked to students being able to gain leadership points.





Prior to the visit, students were set challenges which included a quiz and designing their own Personal Preference Kits (PPK).

NASA introduced PPKs for astronauts to take with them on missions into space. These included personal items and memorabilia and had to be pre-approved by NASA. The astronauts were limited on the size and weight of their PPK. Our students have had some great ideas including personal mementos, food and fun things to try in space.

Before becoming an Astronaut, Helen Sharman worked as a chemist for the confectioner Mars, which included walking down a production line and tasting samples of chocolate! During our challenges, students also got to try some chocolate tasting! Using the taste and feel in the mouth, students guessed the pH level of milk chocolate, dark chocolate, white chocolate and a Mars bar. This was definitely the favourite challenge this term!

The last challenge of the term was to design a badge for a space suit. We received some great designs, here are a few:

We now have five copies of Vol 1 and three copies of the subsequent series, as well as the novellas. These have all been gratefully received, with many students waiting to read them!

The new online library system is now in place and allows students (and parents/carers) to access it from home via the app on their iPads. Students can search through the catalogue via keywords,





titles or authors, reserve books, renew, and see what's in stock. It will take a little bit of time for the entire library to be scanned in and edited, but so far we have these genres ready for reading:

Fantasy, Sci-fi, Dystopian and Adventure; Mystery; Young Adult; Teen Fiction; Horror; Manga and Graphic Novels; Autobiography; Disney Fantasy. Waiting for completion are Non-Fiction; Historical Fiction; Classics; Poetry and Short Stories; Revision Guides.

Students have attended assemblies to teach them how to log-in to the new system and use it. There have been hundreds of students already busy reserving and collecting books via the App. The system sends out automatic emails to remind students to return their books on time, and it emails them to let them know that books are ready to collect. In the future, the database will hold weblinks, PDFs, magazines and online resources to boost subject knowledge, so students can search up what they're studying in History, for example, and have access to a host of safe websites, videos and resources to help them learn.
