Youth Parliament Success

The UK Youth Parliament (UKYP) holds its elections every two years and all young people aged 11-18 are invited to run and vote in the election. Medway is entitled to have two members of the UKYP and each secondary school in our area is welcomed to enter up to a maximum of two candidates in the local election.

Medway Youth Council is a forum for young people – run by young people. They are solely independent but are supported by the Medway Council. MYC has two key roles: to address issues raised by young people, and to act as a consultative group for decision-makers.

Following a highly competitive internal process, involving 20 budding youth politicians, two Year 10 students from Chatham Grammar were chosen to be our academy's representatives in the election. The Medway voting then took place across late January and early February, with the overall results being announced on Thursday 21st March 2024.

In a record year for voter turnout, over 8,300 young people across 21 Medway secondary schools voted in what was a very well contested race – four of the candidates each received over 1,000 votes!

It is with great pride that we can announce the student with the highest number of votes was our very own Amelia. Congratulations, Amelia! You will make an outstanding member of the UK Youth Parliament and we look forward to supporting you over the next two years.

The good news for Chatham Grammar didn't end there. Given the high level of votes they achieved and how close the outcomes were, our second candidate, Abigail, has been invited to become a deputy member of the Youth Parliament. Congratulations, Abigail, you were so close to the second seat and you will be an excellent deputy.





We'd like to extend our congratulations to all of the candidates from the other schools who made this such a high-quality and rewarding process. A huge thank you to Medway Youth Council and the Medway Council Youth Service for all their hard work in organising the election and making it such a successful year.

Mary Seacole Trust Competition

Students of Seacole House received a fantastic opportunity to design a tote bag for the Mary Seacole Trust in London. The Trustee's chose six students as finalists, as well as choosing the winner of the design which was Year 8 student, Freya.

The Mary Seacole Trust exists to educate and inform the public about the life, work and achievements of Mary Seacole, the 19th century Jamaican-born nurse who overcame racism and injustice to nurse soldiers during the Crimean War. Their role is to maintain the statue for future generations.

On Thursday 21st March 2024, students were invited to the Young Seacole Ambassador's Competition 2024 Winner's Reception, to celebrate their achievements with other students from both primary and secondary schools across the UK.

All finalists attended the Winners' Reception at The UnderGlobe in London, with the evening including performances from Cassandra, the Mary Seacole actress from the Florence Nightingale Museum, and Tia Murrell, previously of the Lion King and The Tina Turner Musical.

The board of trustees in the Mary Seacole Trust decided that our winning entry deserved even more recognition, so they have decided to use this as a badge for the Trust. This badge is also going to be distributed nationally as well as to the Florence Nightingale Hospital who the Trust collaborates with.

Additionally, Ms Keers of Seacole House and Ms Lee of Kahlo House were invited to enjoy the celebrations and commend students of Chatham Grammar.

Neveah, Year 11 Student, Kahlo House



Olivia shows dedication and commitment by training six days a week for 1.5-2 hours a day in Tunbridge Wells, as well as additional strength and conditioning training weekly before the academy day. This is what goes on behind the scenes to support the success Olivia has achieved at these championships. This is all gained alongside her studies, keeping up with her homework and maintaining high grades.

The Who's Who Mentoring Programme will start in Term 5. Year 6 students from all six of our primary partnership schools have the opportunity to participate in an interactive careers focussed workshop delivered by Careers Guidance Charts. This will be followed by an inspirational talk from Esther Johnson, a local illustrator and previous Chatham Grammar student, about her career journey so far.

The Chatham Grammar Experience returns again with an even bigger programme on offer! It's a great opportunity for Year 5 primary students from Medway schools to visit Chatham Grammar and participate in a programme of after school curriculum-based taster workshops. The two-part series will be delivered by Dr Chloe Farahar, from Aucademy, on Monday 22nd and 29th April 2024 for parents, carers, and relatives of autistic young people. The sessions will take place at Brompton Academy.

Monday 22nd April: In this session, Dr Farahar demonstrates a critical perspective on what is presently called "autism spectrum disorder", presenting the more tangible and varied Autistic experience perspective.

Monday 29th April: In this session, Dr Farahar discusses the evidence for the use of CBT with Autistic people, and asks attendees to consider the wellbeing of Autistic people and not how to change Autistic experience.

Please note that the sessions contain real-life narratives about being Autistic.
